Democracy In Action

Due to the overwhelming success of the recent blind primary, Illinois governor Jim Thompson has proposed a new bill to be brought up for consideration early next month. This bill would eliminate all names from the primary ballot, allowing the voter to chose from a barrage of numbers. When questioned about the validity of such a proposal, the governer replied, "The selection of candidates by the random choosing of numbers will help the voters. There really are no differences between the candidates, thus the blind selection should help those with problems in reading ethnic names. In addition, the new system will help voters by freeing them of the dreadful chore of listening to politicians talk for hours on end and never say anything."

If this is a successful program, the governor said he would try to utilize the number system even more effectively by combining elections with the state lottery, thus giving a shot in the arm to both programs.

The constitutionality of this system has already been brought to a test. After several hours of deliberating, the Illinois Supreme Court upheld the validity of the law which caused so much confusion for Republican voters in the March 18 primary. In a brief statement from the court, Justice Daniel P. Ward said, "We rejected arguments that: the blind primary process was an improper delegation of the legislature's powers resulting in differential treatment of voters; that it's an intracate conglomeration of heterogeneous pelitical entrepeneurs; that a vicissitude of such magnitude was not in keeping with the constitution of the GOP; contd, 3

## MUSIC REVIEW Van Halen The Classics Of Tommorow Today

The full artistry of Van Halen never really hit me until I was fortunate enough to hear "Beautiful Girls" on the jukebox eight times in one class period. Being a discriminating music critic, I was, of course, struck by the fantastic music appreciation of my fellow students. They know when they have heard true musical mastery, fused with inspired, deeply probing lyrics.

The words were, of course, superb, in that fantastic Van Halen tradition. Such socially relevant phrases as "Bottoms Up" and a good occasional "Yeow!" led me to expect only the greatest from these modern day Shakespears. I wasn't dissapointed. I was treated to lyrics that exposed such universal truths and messages as, "Got a drink in my hand and my toes in the sand, all I need is a beautiful girl!" Such mastery comes only once in a lifetime, perhaps even eternity.

But these immortal lyrics were not their greatest achievement. I think that came with their creative theory in harmonizing. I was very impressed with Van Halen's off key vocalizing. In this critics opinion, the creative innovation of singing out of tune is a magnificent breakthrough in music theory. What we see here may be the most influential trend in musical history since Beethoven's 3rd Symphony bridged the gap between 18th and 19th century music, changing forever the face of classical composition.

The impact of Van Halen's skill cannot be underestimated. They are the force driving music into the 80's: may they continue far into the future. Perhaps they will even surpass the great group KISS someday. by James Musich Herbis
